

PANDAS

PEDIATRIC AUTOIMMUNE NEUROPSYCHIATRIC DISORDER ASSOCIATED WITH STREPTOCOCCAL INFECTIONS

- I. Children are observed developing tics and OCD symptoms after an infection.
- 2. First named in 1998, still controversial (not evidence-based); not in the DSM-5; the ICD-11 mentions it under autoimmune central nervous system disorders, but diagnostic criteria are not defined and no specific code for PANS (Pediatric acute-onset neuropsychiatric syndrome, a broader group) or PANDAS is given.
- 3. Few practitioners diagnose and treat PANDAS
- 4. Psychotropic medications to treat tics and OCD are used in treatment. Some practitioners also use prophylactic antibiotic treatments and intravenous immunoglobin therapies, both of which have a substantial risk of adverse effects



COMPLAINT

Licensee: Dr. Frank, a PANDAS practitioner

Complainants: 3 former employees: I APRN, 2 Pas

Allegations:

1. Licensee is 72 years old and has not had a fitness-to-practice as CMS requires

- 2. Staff noticed some cognitive decline following multiple COVID infections and a fall that knocked him out for a couple of minutes
- 3. He has appeared in the office in a disheveled state
- 4. Some patients have complained to the staff that he appeared confused
- 5. Missed work without notice, causing issues for patients who came in from out of state/out of country
- 6. During weekly podcasts with patients, unable to respond as quickly as in previous years
- 7. Took a leave of absence "but still reachable via phone every couple of days"
- 8. In taking over patients during his absence, staff noticed "PANDAS protocols" not followed, and no justification or notation in the medical records
- 9. Staff noticed prescriptions for diabetes and methadone, and the practice does not treat for diseases meriting those medications
- 10. Became unreachable; staff told by family members he was in alcohol rehabilitation facility out of state
- 11. Licensee did contact office to get copy of license to write prescriptions for patients while in rehab treatment facility
- 12. No pay to staff for over a month
- 13. He has not paid his business taxes (notice came to the office in his absence)
- 14. Office and practice closed by complainants after one month of no contact no pay, unable to handle volume of patients, PA supervision issues
- 15. Licensee has posted in social media that he is back in the office and his practice will open soon.
